I hope you are taking the time to read the tips on character building. This month is one of my favorite


and is so very important "Tolerance" Take time to read each month.

Tolerance

What is Tolerance? We practice tolerance when we maintain a fair and objective attitude toward others. People often differ from us in opinion, practice, belief or custom; tolerance allows us to accept and appreciate our differences. True tolerance is having your beliefs of others even when they are different from your own.

Children's view of "the right way" is fixed in early adolescence. According to some experts, it is defined at age 12 and set by age 21. If children grow up with a limited view of possibilities, their definition of acceptable practices will be narrow.

Tolerance requires coping skills, especially when we are confronted by someone with conflicting values or points of view that have strong emotional overtones, such a politics and religion. In order to be tolerant, we must first keep our emotions in check.

Children are born without bias or prejudice. Their point of view and respect for other points of view will come from their family and society. Parents are the child's first teachers. Parents and teachers have a profound influence on children's attitudes and beliefs.

Examine your own biases and attitudes. Think of ways to consciously reduce any negative influences on the attitudes of the children around you.

Activities:

Solicit pen pals from another country. Help children identify similarities and different customs.

Make 5 different puppets. Have your child decorate the puppets to look like his or her friends. Discuss how each puppet is unique in its own special way.

Make sure you purchase the new multi-cultural crayons. It's impossible to represent the world around you with the basic crayons in any classroom.

Travel as much as possible, a trip to Lancaster or New Mexico can help your child understand different customs especially if you travel around the world.

Be a good role model. As children are introduced to your values and traditions make them aware that other people may have values and traditions that are different but not wrong. Avoid judgment statements about weight, gender, religious beliefs, skin color or clothing that make characteristics of others seem less desirable. Engage your child in chores that are not typical for his or her gender. Let the girls work with dad using tools or working on lawn and let the boys bake or sew.

Have a multi-cultural all traditions party— Invite many families to share food and present a their traditions. This is especially fun to do around the holidays. Read books about the many different ways people celebrate the holidays.
